

It goes to show we never know when Atius will call our name home. I want to wish all of our people good travels and may Atius smile upon you on your adventures.

It is coming time for elections and we are wishing all those who are running in the upcoming Pawnee Business Council elections the best of luck. For those of us who have to decide who to vote for, I hope that you will give each and every candidate their due respect and look at each of their qualifications and abilities. Being on the Business Council is a strong responsibility. We sometimes think that when we get on

the Pawnee Tribal Council, we can do so many things, but we need to realize that we are only one vote. We need to make sure what we do for the Pawnee people is in their best interest. So I trust that when you go to the polls that you will vote for the best person, someone that you feel will do the best things for the Pawnee people.

In the past two years we have seen a lot of things, including the new police station that was built, it is a wonderful building, and the Bridge to the Great Pawnee Nation completed and is being used daily by many people and by people who swore that it was a bridge to no-where. It is very useful and has helped many people. You also see the refurbishing of roundhouse, probably one of the most heartfelt and spiritual buildings on the reserve, where we hold handgames, war dances, funerals and even the dirt in the center of the roundhouse came from Nebraska. It holds many special feelings for a lot of people. Although people have their feelings about re-doing it, it's going to be wonderful when it is done. We will have a warm place in the winter, a cool place in the summer, we will have modern facilities for all of our dances and gatherings that we have. There will be lighting in the parking lot and a cooking area; it will be a very special place. You will see that the inside of the roundhouse will not be as different as it was before. Then it will be a real joy to participate in things in the middle of winter and our different functions we have in the middle of summer like this last summer when it was 117 degrees outside for our visitation and we suffered through it, now we will have a cool place to go. So we are looking forward to the completion of the roundhouse. We are also looking to break ground on the elder's center. It will be a place, we hope, that they will enjoy and make great use of.

Here in the near future, we will be promoting our Great Pawnee Nation on radio dial 1600 AM, KUSH radio from 9-10 am and that will start on March 20th and continue once a month. It has been a dream of mine that we have a radio station to promote our programs, our people and all the different things that the Pawnee Nation does. KUSH has donated time, so we will have an hour a month and grow from there. This time will allow us to tell about our history, programs, chiefs and our Pawnee Nation College plus more. We are excited to be given this opportunity to expand our outreach.

Powwow season is nearing and everyone is getting ready for traveling. Denver March has come and gone and we hope that everyone had safe travels and good times. We wish the best to all who are going to Gathering of Nations, this is the kickoff of those who follow that drum and hope that each of

you will win plenty of prize money to pay your way around the country. We have world class dancers and singers from here, the Great Pawnee Nation, that go all over the country and we wish you well.

We were greatly honored to have the Millikin University Students here from Illinois to come down and do a lot of work at our cemeteries. That means a lot to us for them to do that, for that is where our folks are buried. There was a handgame put on by the Pawnee Nation Employees Club to teach them a little bit of our culture. They were fed well every night and our staff helped to entertain them and tried to make them feel welcome the best we knew how and we enjoyed their company. They were nice young students and we appreciate them. It's not that often that we get to have visitors like that. We enjoyed them and we had a good handgame. We had more people at the handgame than we seem to have when we plan one for several months. It was a real joy to have them here and to break bread with them almost every night.

My wish is that everyone had a Happy Easter. As we remember this holiday, let us remember what Easter is all about, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. May his blessing and the blessing of Atius be on all of us and the Great Nation of Pawnee.

In closing, please continue to pray for our Pawnee people, community, our Elders and Soldiers.





# PAWNEE BUSINESS COUNCIL FOURTH QUARTER 2012 MINUTES

Please understand that the following are only a brief synopsis of topics and actions taken by the Pawnee Business Council.

### Jan. 9, 2013 PBC Meeting:

Five Council members were present; Jestes and Fields were excused. Those present provided reports on their meetings and Committees since the last Council meeting. Executive Director Dawna Hare and TDC CEO Roger Smith provided reports.

# Treaties and Old Friends are Forever

The Pawnees' most sacred site, Pahaku which is located in Fulton, Neb. This location is currently often referred to as "Lovers' Leap" by locals.

On Jan. 23, 1863, representatives of the Pawnee Nation and the Yankton Sioux Tribe signed a Treaty into existence. This little known, but seminal legal document entitled "Treaty Between the Pawnee Nation and the Yankton Sioux Tribe" ("Treaty") recently sprang onto the Federal Indian Law stage. The Treaty was executed by six signatories in behalf of the Pawnee people and six for the Yankton people. Both groups of delegates, interpreters, and other entourage travelled to the Ponca Reserve in Niobrara, Dakota Territory for this unique, innovative, and historic ceremony. This Treaty of peace between the Pawnee and Yankton must have been considered insignificant because it is not even listed in Kapplar and is difficult to find elsewhere. However, the document did not go unnoticed in the Dakota Territory. In 1915, Hon. George W. Kingsbury wrote of the Treaty in his History of Dakota Ter-

It was the first treaty between Indians that was reduced to written terms that we have record of... [it was] A treaty for the establishment of peace and restoration of friendship, made and concluded in grand council at the peace village on the Ponca Reservation in the Territory of Dakota.

The Peace Treaty was important enough, however, to induce Pawnee delegates, led by Crooked Hand, to travel the 130 miles in January between Genoa and Niobrara. At the same time, a delegation of Yankton Sioux led by Struck by the Ree left their reserve near present day North

Ponca Both serve. frigid weath-Reserve. Crooked Hand's journey may have been a little diffimore cult because he was still recovering from wounds received in a battle with an overwhelming force of Brulé Sioux only months earlier.

It was the middle of the Civil War and most

U.S. troops were in the East fighting, and the Indians were doing as they pleased. In order to get the tribes to quit fighting one another, the U.S. government persuaded them to make Peace Treaties. The Pawnee/Sioux Treaty was the first one. This Treaty has been good for 150 years on Jan. 2013.

In June, 2012, the Yankton Sioux Tribe reached out to the Pawnee Nation through the Office of Historic Preservation. The Yankton General Council empowered Ms. Faith Spotted Eagle to deal with all things related to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA).and all things related to the Keystone XL Pipeline. Ms. Spotted Eagle's course of action was to enlarge the power group opposed to the pipeline. That meant allying with other tribes and organizations with similar sentiments regarding the pipeline. Knowing that the Pawnee people were also dealing with the pipeline, Ms. Spotted Eagle contacted Mr. Adams, Pawnee THPO and presented her idea. Ms. Spotted Eagle's idea was two-fold. First, to ceremonially renew or confirm the friendship that had existed between the people of the Yankton Sioux Tribe and the people of the Pawnee Nation for nearly 150 years. And, second, to form an alliance between the Sioux and the Pawnees in order to better

fight the Keystone XL pipeline.

When I heard the word, "alliance," I immediately thought to myself, "Treaty." I am a huge proponent of treaties in the context of true Tribal sovereignty. I believe that we, as In- sented various strategies ranging from Aho!

ed for the often as possible in order to strengthen what sovereignty we possess. This is the way I look at Tribal sovereignty: parties strug-gled through By virtue of a vague reference to In-dians in the U.S. Constitution's Commerce Clause, the federal government to reach reserves the right to regulate com-Ponca merce and make treaties with sover-eign foreign nations, and "Indian na-b k e d tions." Under federal Indian law, here lies the root of our sovereignty. Only sovereigns can make treaties with other sovereigns. Follow this syllogism: The federal government only makes treaties with sovereigns, the federal government makes treaties with Indian nations, therefore, Indian nations are sovereigns. So I figure that if we make treaties with other Indian nations, we are exercising our sovereign right to make treaties, just as with any other sovereign nation in the world.

The pipeline's proposed route bi-sects the Sioux and Pawnee ancestral homeland. The Pawnees have Sacred sites in the pathway of the construction and intend to protect them from others as well, a good chance of causing that multi-billion dollar operation from just barging their way through our ancestral territory seems to be a

possibility.
Over the next few weeks, Ms.
Spotted Eagle and I worked closely at investigating every idea we could the Sioux was applied by One Strikes brainstorm. At the same time, Faith the Ree, Faith Spotted Eagle's greatand I arranged for the leaders of the Sioux and Pawnee Nations to plan a ceremonial reaffirmation of the 150 year-old treaty, and in a separate event, agree to ally their tribes in a consolidated and unified front against pipeline construction. Over the next couple of months, many other orgato join the struggle. These organizations included "Blockaders," farmers, ranchers, Green People, and other tribal nations.

As time grew shorter, the logistics of bringing the member organizations together for the event became more urgent. Seven (7) Pawnees attended the ceremony. President Marshall the ceremony. President Marshall Gover; Councilman Richard Tilden; Executive Director Dawna Hare and Husband Charles (Yankton); Attorney Walter EchoHawk, Historić Preservation Officer; Gordon Adams, William Howell and Steven Moore. It is interesting to note that partisanship functions at high levels in Pawnee culture, and is evidenced by our Executive Director's choice in Charles as her spouse.

All ceremonies were concluded by noon. For the rest of the day and the following day, organizations pre-

Dakota head- dian Nations, need to make treaties as throwing their own bodies down in front of trucks and bulldozers (Blockaders), to actively taking up arms, to legal remedies. Not surprisingly, this story caught the attention and imagination of many, and several Canadian tribes are wanting into the alliance between the Sioux and the Pawnee.

On the afternoon of Jan. 25, 2013 the three day event concluded with the making of a formal Treaty between with Yankton Sioux and the Pawnee Nation to mutually assist one another in their resistance to construction of the Keystone XL pipeline. One hundred and thirty one Indian Nations

also signed in support.

The ironic part is that the Pawnee and the Sioux were mortal enemies for hundreds of years prior to 1863. In addition to the Yankton Sioux, the other 6 bands of the Sioux Nation now wish to join forces, along with other Canadian Tribes, as well as the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska. Great thanks must also be expressed to "4 Worlds," a private organization who donated \$15,000 to pay for hotel rooms and desecration. With the assistance the sioux are able to provide, and many meals for those attending the ceremonies. Special thanks should also go to nies.
