It is the goal of the Pawnee Nation Youth Fund to provide each enrolled Pawnee student K-12, with funds in the form of a VISA gift card, expressly for the students use, under the following guidelines:

1. The student MUST be an enrolled member of the Pawnee Nation.

- 2. The student/parent completes the application process.
- 3. The student is in or entering ing. grades K - 12.
- 4. The student/parent provides verification of enrollment in a public, or private school.

5. In the event the student is home schooled the student/ parent must show verification from the accrediting agency.

6. The student/parent only purchases items needed for school; clothes, school supplies, back packs and other school related items. Ineligible items include games, movies and other non-

school related items. The cards will be in the 7. amount of \$125 per semester, per student.

The card will be issued 8. pending a completed application.

9. Students/parents must present original receipts showing details of items purchased from the 1st semester to obtain a gift card for 2nd semester purchas-

10. Students/parents must reapply for 2nd semester fund-

11. Receipts must be turned in when reapplying.

12. Lost or stolen cards will not be replaced.

13. Applications will be made available in June (fall) and December (spring). Deadlines are noted below.

New Deductions for the Pawnee Nation Food Distribution Program

The Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations:

Income Deductions and Resources Eligibility will go into effect on Sept. 26, 2013. This will expand access to FDPIR and more closely align FDPIR with the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). These changes will:

Eliminate the household resource test as a basis for determining eligibility, Expand the current medical deductions,

Establish a standard deduction for shelter and utility expenses,

Establish verification requirements related to the new income deductions,

Revise the household reporting requirements.

PAWNEE NATION BURIAL POLICY

PURPOSE:

This policy is to provide guide-lines to the Pawnee Nation in providing financial assistance, services and facilities for our tribal families that have incurred a death.

ELIGIBILITY:

Enrolled members of Pawnee Nation.

a) Infants under the age of one year that qualify for Pawnee tribal enrollment (at least 1/8 Pawnee blood quantum), or are eligible for enrollment, but have not been en-rolled or received burial assistance from another Tribe.

b) Infants over the age of one year of age that have not been en-rolled are not eligible for assistance unless an enrollment for the infant's enrollment has been filed with Pawnee Tribal Enrollment Office

AMOUNT OF ASSISTANCE: The Pawnee Business shall set

the amount for burial assistance in the annual budgeting process. The amount of burial will be estab-lished in the annual tribal operating budget.

The maximum amount of assistance available tor 2013 and 2014 is:

a) \$4,500 payable to the fu-neral home for burial; and

b) \$500 is payable to the person that financially responsible for the burial to be used for immediate needs; and

c) amounts will be the responsibility cation and verification is made.

of the person financially responsible for burial costs; and

d) Any funds not expended will be retained in the burial fund.

CHECK DISBURSEMENT:

Checks will be issued to the funeral home (not to exceed \$4,500) and person that is financially responsible for the burial costs, normally the next of kin, i.e. spouse, parent, adult, child, etc. (\$500).

Checks are high priority and issued in an expedient manner, usu-ally within 24 hours.

Records shall be maintained in Finance that includes payee, address, check number, date issued, and signature line if check is picked up.

NOTIFICATION OF DEATH:

The Pawnee Nation is normally notified by the family of the death. Verification is to be provided with the funeral home, law enforcement, written statement from relative

Upon notification and verification of death, Executive Office verifies tribal enrollment with Enrollment Office. Enrollment Offices provides date of birth and enrollment number.

Address of payee is required.

Deaths not reported within a year will not be eligible for payment.

TRIBAL FLAGS:

Pawnee Tribal Flag will be low-Any costs exceeding these ered for tribal members after notifi-

Veterans upon notification and veri-

fication is made. Flags will be lowered in com-pliance with the existing policy for four days.

In the event of a burial being delayed over four days due to ser-vices being held out of the Pawnee area, cremation and a memorial service held later, or similar situation, flags will be raised on the fifth day

Pawnee Business Council Pres ident can have the tribal flags low-

ered for extenuating circumstances. The U.S. Flag will be lowered for a congressional honor or by Presidential Proclamation.

BUILDING USE:

Tribal buildings (Roam Chief Event Center, Roundhouse, and Community Building) shall be made available for tribal members for viewing, wakes, services, feasts, and dinners at no cost.

No deposit is required. The Tribal Operations staff is responsible for the upkeep and cleaning of buildings. In event of a large crowd, the Multi-Purpose Building and or the Wellness Center may be used. In accordance with Policy Rental, funerals have priority and other events may be cancelled or moved.

Non -enrolled members may be granted building use at a reduced rate (actual cost of the building usage). The total cost schedule associated with the burial including the

Pawnee Indian Veteran's Flag use of the building and labor costs will be lowered for Pawnee Indian will be updated annually. Payable when building is reserved.

CEMETERIES:

Pawnee Tribal cemeteries are available for tribal members' burial. Tribal Operations staff will prepare the grave site, cover it and maintain it

Non- tribal members may be buried in the cemeteries next to an enrolled spouse, parent, child, or other enrolled family member for a minimal fee. Tribal operations shall assess a charge for the grave preparation services and the cost of the plot.

DISPUTES:

Tribe will handle disputes on an individual basis.

Cancelled checks will be kept on file, and upon request copies will be furnished to any tribal members disputing they received a check or that the check was issued to the wrong person.

If the payee misrepresents being next of kin or the person of record responsible for the burial cost and is not, the case will be forwarded to Law Enforcement.

Pawnee Nation District Court shall be the court of jurisdiction. If the court rules payee should not have received the payment, the payee is responsible for costs involved in the prosecution.

Tolkien in Pawneeland

One of my grandmothers was Skidi, and my other grandmother had English and German ancestry. So I found it fascinating and meaningful when I discovered that my favorite author, JRR Tolkien (who was English with German ancestry), made use of certain obscure Skidi traditions in his writings. As I studied the evidence for this. I slowly came to the conclusion that between 1919 and 1942 Tolkien drew on at least six Skidi Pawnee stories to sculpt subtle aspects of characters and events in The Book of Lost Tales, The Hobbit, and The Lord of the Rings.

In the course of this research, I was fortunate to have the support of the Grey Havens Group – a circle of friends who gathered each week to discuss and appreciate Tolkien's writings. They encouraged me to present my ideas in May 2013 at our symposium, Real Myth and Mithril. I followed this with a longer talk in July 2013 at Mythcon 44, an annual conference of the Mythopoeic Society.

The Pawnee oral traditions that inspired Tolkien were preserved through the efforts of a Skidi named James R. Murie. He narrated stories to the staff of the Field Museum of Natural History, and an anthropologist there edited and published them in a 1904 book called Traditions of the Skidi Pawnee. A copy of this book made its way across the Atlantic Ocean and into the collections of Oxford University in England. And in 1919, after Tolkien began working as a researcher at Oxford, echoes of various Skidi narratives began to enter his writings.

Two of the stories that interested Tolkien were told to Murie by an old man named Roaming Scout, a leading kurahus or priest.
